- William Tell and Gessler are two very different characters! On the **Describe Them!** sheet, see if you can work out which *adjectives* (describing words) could be used to talk about the hero and the villain.



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SWITZERLAND FACT SHEET

- Switzerland is a small country in Europe with many neighbours! It is next to France, Germany, Italy, Austria, and a tiny nation called Liechtenstein!
- There is no one 'Swiss' language. Different parts of the country speak different languages: French in the west, German in the east, Italian in the south, and Romansh in the southeast.

 Most Swiss can speak more than one language!
- Romansh is only spoken in a small part of Switzerland, but it is a very interesting language. It is a version of Latin, which was the language of the ancient Romans which is how it got its name!
- Much of Switzerland lies in the Alps, which are a high range of mountains in the middle of Europe. The melted snow from the mountains helps to fill Switzerland's many lakes.
- When it comes to wars, Switzerland is neutral! This means that they do not take a side. They only have a small full-time army and air force, but most Swiss men have to do military training so they can help defend the country if needed.
- Switzerland is divided up into 26 different regions, called 'cantons'. They all have different histories, foods, accents and even laws!
- Many European countries were ruled by kings in the Middle Ages, but not Switzerland! The country was formed when various towns and provinces in the Alps decided to work together to stop kings and emperors from bossing them around.
- Switzerland's mountains are home to herds of cows. This milk is used to make Swiss cheese and chocolate, which are world-famous. Switzerland's favourite soft drink is also made out of milk!
- Two of Switzerland's most famous foods are fondue and raclette, which are made with melted cheese.
- Switzerland used to be a poor country, but in modern times the Swiss have become experts at banking, medicine, and making machinery. Swiss watches are famous for being very accurate and very expensive!

ALL ABOUT MOUNTAINS!

Much of Switzerland is in the Alps. Find out more about this amazing mountain range on this fact sheet!

The Alps is the biggest mountain range that lies entirely in Europe!

Melting snow from the Alps feeds into many of Europe's biggest rivers. 90% of the continent's fresh water comes from these mountains!

Mountain ranges are often used to mark borders between countries. That's why so many of the world's highest mountains are on borders!

Mountains can be formed in many ways. The Alps were formed when

two of the huge plates of rock

that make up the Earth's surface bumped into each other

Parts of the Swiss Alps were once on the bottom of the sea, but got turned into mountains when the African plate hit the Eurasian plate. That is why people have found seashells high in the mountains!

People have been living in the Alps for many thousands of years. In 1991 the frozen body of a man who lived

5000 years ago was found in the Alps between Italy and Austria. He was named Otzi!

Beyond 9.000 feet above sea level, there are glaciers and a permanent blanket of snow.

The Alps stretch **1.200 km** across eight countries: Austria, France, Germany, Italy, Liechtenstein, Monaco, Slovenia and Switzerland!

reversed. (It has a red cross on a white background).

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


