

IN BRIEF

The Enchanted Canary is a magical fairy tale about a prince who goes to a distant land in search of a princess who has been transformed into a canary. It inspired this pack, which is full of fairy tale activities and fun facts about birds!



1. LITERACY LESSON IDEAS

- The **Storytime Glossary** contains words from this month's issue that might be unfamiliar to readers. Ask kids to refer to it if they don't know what a word means.
- The Class Discussion Sheet is all about difference! The questions encourage students to think about how the characters in 'The Enchanted Canary' are different from each other, and how difference can be a positive thing!
- The **Reading Comprehension Sheet** features an excerpt that includes a *question mark*, a *comparative* and an *adjective* relating to temperature. This activity could be used to start talking about similar words and types of punctuation.
- Challenge the class to unjumble the events on the **Story Sequencing Sheet**. Which event came first? Put a '1' after that one! Then, they should continue labelling the events to show the order they *should* be read in...
- Getting students to retell a story in their own words is a great way to develop their reading comprehension and writing skills. The **Storyboard** pages have illustrations that serve as visual cues, and spaces for them to tell their version of our fairy tale!
- Adjectives are words that are used to describe things, and the **Adjective Action!** activity asks kids to match the adjectives to the four main characters in this month's fairy tale.
- Kids can create their own magical tales using the Roll Up a Fairy Story! page. They should follow the flowchart, and where there is a blank space for a character, place, object or adjective, they roll a dice and check the table to see what it should be! After they have completed the flowchart, they could write out their story...



1. LITERACY LESSON IDEAS CONTINUED

- **The Tale Before the Tale** is a writing activity that encourages kids to come up with their own story about how and why Lucia was turned into a canary!
- Test how well students understood this month's story by challenging them to complete the tricky **True or False?** quiz!

2. SCIENCE LESSON IDEAS

- The **Bird Words** activity introduces seven bird-related terms and challenges students to match each one with the correct definition. How many can they get right?
- The colourful Amazing Bird Cards! have facts about six very different birds from around the world. Can kids find the places each one comes from on a map? After the class has read the cards, ask them to use what they have learned to complete the Matching Meals! activity on the next page, which is about what different birds eat!
- Observing our feathered friends is a mindful activity that connects us with nature. The **Birdwatching Basics** tells kids how to get started with this hobby!

3. ART LESSON IDEAS

- Origami is the Japanese art of making things out of folded paper. The cool Canary Origami page shows kids how to turn a square of paper into a cute canary – can your class make a whole flock of them?
- The **Fingerprint Friends!** activity is all about making a simple fingerprint into a piece of art, using only a pen, paper and an ink pad or paint-soaked sponge.
- The figure on the Feather an Enchanted Canary! sheet needs some feathers... and adding them would make a cool class activity. When the sheet is printed out, it's time to start stick on feathers. They could be cut out of coloured paper or card or you could use shiny paper or even real feathers!





Did you know? Flamingoes get their pink colour from the shrimps they eat!


BALD EAGLE

From: New Zealand





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BIRDWATCHING BASICS

Birdwatching is the favourite hobby of the king in this month's story — and it can be a fun and rewarding activity! Follow the tips below to start your birdwatching journey and tick off the different birds on the sheet...

1. Get your gear!

All you need
is a pencil and
this sheet, printed
out. A clipboard
and some small
binoculars can
also be useful,
and don't forget a
waterproof jacket!

2. Find a good spot for spotting! A park is a good place to start. Go with an adult, and be careful around ponds and streams!

3. Stay still!
When you find a
good spot, don't
move around
too much. Birds
will get nervous
and fly away!

- 4. Use your ears! Keep quiet and see if you can hear the sound of birds.This will help you find them!
- **5. Record your findings!** Tick off the birds on the list below when you spot them. If you see a bird that isn't on the list, write down how big it is, what it looks like, and so on. Try to identify it online when you get home!

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
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


CANARY ORIGAMI


Here's how to make your own beautiful bird with a square sheet of paper! Use yellow paper to make a canary – or make your bird any colour you like!




Fold one corner of the paper across to the other side of the paper and crease it.




2 Cut the paper into two triangles along the crease, using scissors.




Fold one of the triangles in half as shown, creating a crease down the middle.




Turn the paper over.




Fold the two outer points of the triangle in as shown.




Fold out the 'wings' you have made.



Fold the triangle along the centre crease to create the bird's body.



Bend the pointy bit at the front of the bird in and down to make a beak for your bird.



Add a shiny black eye on each side and your canary is done!
