Follow these tips to begin reading regularly with kids. It's easier than you think!

▶ Plan it together! Read through this pack with the child. Talk about the different activities and which ones they would enjoy doing.

Make time! Try to set aside some time to read a story with the child. The tales in **Storytime Australia** are short, so enjoying them doesn't have to involve a big time commitment. Keep a few issues around so you can pick up a story anytime!

Reading a story is a great time-out! If children are bored or have had too much 'screen time',

sitting down with them for a shared reading session is an ideal change of pace.





MAKE-BELIEVE TIME!

Stories are brilliant at stimulating young imaginations, and these fun activities encourage kids to use their creativity to come up with their own amazing stories. Why not try them out?

PLAY A ROLE!

Set Up: Ask the child to imagine that they are someone (or something!) else! They could pretend to be a robot, a hamster, or a kid from Roman times. Ask them about how they would experience the world! For more fun: A costume can help them get into a role!

ONCE UPON A TIME.

Set Up: Tell the child about a certain place. It could be from fiction, from the past... or even from your childhood. Tell them about the sights, the sounds and the smells. Ask them to imagine that they are there, and encourage them to ask questions! For more fun: Use a picture to show them what the place is like!

LET'S GO OUT!

storytin

Going out is a great way to stimulate a young mind! Go to the beach, the woods or the park. Ask the child what creatures might live there, or what might lie around the next corner...

PROPS FOR ALL!

Set Up: Find an interesting object – it could be an old device, a strange tool, a little ornament or anything else that could spark the imagination. Hand it to the child and get them to tell you what they observe about it. What do they imagine it could be used for? For more fun: Team up to create a cool story about the object and why it was made!

WHY MAKE-BELIEVE IS GOOD!

It encourages emotional development! Taking on the role of someone else or imagining how a character could feel helps children develop emotional intelligence!

It boosts creativity! A child's imagination is like a muscle the more they exercise it, the stronger it gets!

It enhances communication skills!

Ask the child to describe what they are imagining. This will encourage them to use their verbal skills in a creative way!

It provides opportunities for critical thinking! Make-believe play encourages kids to think outside of the box. They evaluate options and experiment with new ideas.

MAKE A STORY JAR!

Fill up a story jar with cool and curious things that can inspire creativity and storytelling!

YOU WILL NEED...

- 1. First, get a large jar or vase. Make sure it is clean and dry before you start using it!
- 2. Make a **'STORY JAR'** label and stick it to your jar with tape!
- 3. Now, fill it up with interesting knick-knacks and curios from around the house!

HOW TO USE THE STORY JAR...

Ask the child to close their eyes and take an object out of the jar. Tell them to describe what it feels like and what they think it could be!

Once they have answered, tell them about the object, where it came from and what it is for. This could start a discussion about your life experiences!

Keep picking objects and talking about them!

Try to create an interesting and imaginative story in which all of the objects appear!


